

- E- Engage in regular revision



Sheila: I'll never, never do it again.


Language Techniques

Exam question- Literature

Point- Your point, idea, or thought that links to the question.

Evidence- Quotation from the text that supports your idea.

Technique- The techniques used in the quotation.

Analyse- the quotation. How does it support your idea? What is it suggesting?

Zoom- in on a specific word or phrase in the quotation.

Explain- The Zoom! What does it suggest? How does it further prove your point? How does it explore the context?

Link- To the writer's intentions/message.

Success Criteria

- Clear points that link to the question
- Embedded quotations
- Naming techniques that link with your analysis
- Detailed analysis with reference to context
- Links to writer's intentions

Evidence- Quotation from the text that supports your idea.


Technique- The techniques used in the quotation.

Explain- The Zoom! What does it suggest? How does it further prove your point? How does it explore the context?


Create Your Own Character Mind Map
